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Holiday Home Tour, by Paulette Brandt

The Historic Homes for the Holidays Tour for 2010, sponsored by Preserve Council Bluffs, took place on Sunday December 5th, from m 2 to 5 pm.

The homes featured this year were: The O.P. Wickham House at 616 South 7th St, built in 1882, now owned by Trent Hemmingsen and Jamie Swanson. It is now a bed and breakfast.

The Charles T. Officer House, owned by Kent and Mary Madison, at 228 5^{th} Ave., built in 1910. They have lived in the home for 27 years.

The Everest House, located at 125 South 3rd Street, built in 1910, now owned by James Kieffer and Gary Lopez. They purchased the home in 2009.

The Cavin House at 150 Park Ave, owned by Marie and David Huggins. They have been there for 17 years, and have completely restored the home to its 1887 glory.

Last on the tour was 149 West Broadway, the Hughes-Irons building, built in 1917, now housing The Council Bluffs Chamber of Commerce on the main level, as well as Scooters Coffee and 17 apartments on the upper level. The building was once home to Hughes Chevrolet, which was in business at that site until 1979.

All of the homes were beautifully decorated in a fashion that complemented the age of the home and style of the owners. I would be hard pressed to pick a favorite.

Police and Neighborhood Meet & Greet

A Council Bluffs Police and Neighborhood meet and greet event, hosted by the Neighborhood Center (NC) and Downtown Neighborhood Alliance (DNA), was held on Tuesday, Oct. 26, at the Council Bluffs Public Library.

The event served as an educational opportunity to learn more about the Community Services Section of the Council Bluffs Police Department, Neighborhood Watch, Police Area Representatives, Project Safe Neighborhood, Neighborhood Associations, and the Neighborhood Center. In addition to these topics, the event highlighted how the Police Department and neighborhoods are collaborating to keep our neighborhoods safe.

Ryan Willer, Outreach Coordinator for the Neighborhood introduced Police Chief Ralph O'Donnell to start the meeting by stating, "We are in the business of building community through neighborhoods. What residents do in their neighborhoods and what the police do in neighborhoods go hand-in-hand in helping to build community. We would like to thank the police department for the active and collaborative role they have taken with us and neighborhoods throughout the City."

Interested residents from different parts of the city attended the event and were able to ask questions of the police chief and Lieutenant Robert Brietzke, Officer Mark Alba and Sergeant Mark Galvan. Several shared their concerns about neighborhood safety as well as their appreciation for the work of the police in Council Bluffs.

Police Chief Ralph O'Donnell stated, "I left with the understanding that this group wants to be involved. I was pleased with the amount of general questions and concerns. I truly believe that this group is active in maintaining their neighborhoods and are willing to assist the police in this matter. I liked the idea of the non-emergency numbers being distributed to this group, and I appreciate the face to face contact with our PAR officers."

Nate Watson, President of the Downtown Neighborhood Alliance, expressed that, "We in the neighborhoods are very fortunate to have such a professional and responsive police department. We look forward to continuing to partner with them as we work together to make our community an even better place to raise our families, know our neighbors, and take part in the many wonderful activities within our city."

This event was intended to be the first of more events bringing the neighborhood residents into contact with the officers who patrol their areas. "It was a good learning experience about communicating with and collaborating with our police department," Watson continued.

"Within the police department's mission statement is a line that fits what we are trying to promote and thank the officers for: "We are committed to creating and maintaining active police/community partnerships and assisting citizens in identifying and solving problems to improve the quality of life in their neighborhoods," explains Sheila Graham, Vice-President of the Downtown Neighborhood Alliance. "We want to thank the department for all of their efforts in our neighborhoods and to strengthen the partnership that we are building with them at this time."

Chief O'Donnell was presented with a certificate of appreciation to share with all the officers, which stated it was, "in recognition of valuable contributions to the neighborhoods and citizens of Council Bluffs through your efforts to make and keep our

neighborhoods safe—we thank you for your dedication and we support you in your work."

RECIPE Corner: Healthy Vegetable Chicken Soup provided by Cory Peters

1 Tb olive oil

½ pound boneless, skinless chicken breast, cut into ½-1-inch chunks (or substitute cooked chicken, if you have it)

1 medium yellow onion, chopped

2 cloves garlic, crushed or minced

3/4 cup sliced carrots

1 cup cauliflower, in thick slices or chunks

2 cups (about 1 14-ounce can) chopped canned tomatoes with juice (seasoned are fine)

4 cups non-fat, low-sodium chicken or vegetable broth

1 cup fresh spinach leaves (torn if you want to fuss)

5 drops Tabasco sauce (optional)

Salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste

In large saucepan, heat oil.

Sauté chicken until no longer pink.

Add onions, garlic and carrots, stirring occasionally for 5 minutes or so, until onions are softened and starting to become translucent.


Add cauliflower, tomatoes and broth.

Simmer, partially covered, for 20 minutes.

Stir in spinach and seasonings, heat for a bit longer, and serve.

Serves 4 (easily doubled or tripled).

Per serving: 168 calories, 19 g protein, 14 g carb, 4 g fat (0.7 saturated), 3 g fiber, 876 mg sodium.
