Habitat for Humanity ReStore Donation Pick Up – Do you have left over building materials from your past few projects? Do you have excess furniture that just doesn't match your décor anymore? Give the Habitat for Humanity of Council Bluffs ReStore a call to find out where to drop off your extra materials/furniture OR to schedule a FREE pick up. Council Bluffs Safe Housing Program - To preserve the existing housing stock and stabilize residential neighborhoods, Community Development offers a Safe Housing Program for homeowners. This program is intended to provide immediate repair and correction of hazardous housing conditions, which represent a threat to the health, safety, and well-being of the occupants. 712 Initiative AMP repair grants – Do you, a friend, or neighbor need a hand with a major EXTERIOR project? The 712 will once again be taking applications for the AMP program in May and June. Limited to homeowners only, awards are chosen based on need, story, and value added. The average award is \$7,000. Clean Sweep / Neighborhood Dumpsters – EARLY MAY - This collective volunteer effort to clean up the community gathers volunteers from around the city and assigns them sections of the community for a Council Bluffs-wide spring cleaning! NEWS & TIDBITS

Celebrate CB Parade is May 14 - 10:30AM to 12:00PM // Downtown Council Bluffs The parade will begin at 10:30 a.m. on May 14 and will wind its way through the downtown streets. The parade theme for this year is "Going for the Gold!" because this year is the year of the Olympics and marks the 50th anniversary of Celebrate CB. Following the parade, there will be free kid activities in the southeast corner of Bayliss Park.

Did You Know...?

The phrase "April showers bring May flowers" is a popular saying used often during the month of April. This is typically the time when the last bit of snow turns to all rain as temperatures climb, and increased rain shower activity sparks the beginning of flowers and plants to really start blooming.

Safety Reminder: Just a reminder that the end of the school year is coming, and with the nicer weather on the way keep careful watch for the children and pets playing in the neighborhood. Be mindful of errant balls, minimize your driving speed, etc. Keep our neighborhood safe! (thanks!)

Kanesville Tabernacle — Interesting history on the Kanesville Tabernacle... The original was built around 1847. Shortly after the building's construction, it became apparent that the building was constructed over the top of a spring and the base of the building was rotting. That building was torn down two years after being completed. The Kanesville Tabernacle was reconstructed in the mid-1990's as a *replica* of the original building. The reconstruction was financed by the Pottawattamie County Mormon Trails Association and Kanesville Restoration, Inc. In 1999, the tabernacle was donated to the LDS Church and it was used as a visitor's center. Like the original tabernacle, the replica was built from cottonwood. The wood shrank two inches in the first two months and was anticipated to shrink another 10 inches in the first five years of its life. To counteract this, the church placed jacks under the main supports that could be lowered as the walls would shrink. The tabernacle was closed a year and a half ago. The first week of April 2022, our town witnessed the demolition of the tabernacle. The site is being replaced by an interpretive landscape with a path that winds past statuary, interpretive panels and gardens.

Cinco de Mayo RECIPE Idea


Celebrate Cinco de Mayo **on May 5** with a refreshing dish that is *not* tacos: **Shrimp** Taco Salad

Ingredients

- Shrimp You will need one pound of white shrimp. To prepare them, use scissors to cut through the shell along the back of the prawns, and remove the shells and tails. Rinse to remove the veins and pat dry with paper towel.
- shrimp taco seasoning made with olive oil, ground cumin, chili powder (optional for a kick), paprika, garlic powder, dried oregano (or Italian seasoning), salt, and ground black pepper.
- romaine lettuce
- · grape tomatoes
- purple cabbage
- avocado
- corn you can use canned corn or frozen corn (boiled in water for 5 minutes).
- · tortilla chips
- cilantro lime dressing
- lime wedges optional, for a squeeze of extra lime juice.

Preparation

- 1. Prepare the shrimp. In a medium bowl, add shrimp, olive oil, cumin, chili powder, paprika, garlic powder, oregano, salt and pepper. Toss well to coat and set aside to marinate for 15 minutes (if you have the time).
- 2. Cook the shrimp. You can cook the shrimp in one of 3 ways -- in the oven, air fryer, or over the stove.
- 3. To cook in the oven: Spread the shrimp evenly on a parchment lined quarter sheet baking pan and bake in a 400 F preheated oven for 8-10 minutes until the shrimp turns pink.
- 4. To cook in the air fryer: Cook the shrimp in the air fryer at 350 F for 8-10 minutes, shaking the basket once halfway through.
- 5. To cook on the stovetop: Sauté over medium-high heat for 5 minutes until shrimp turns pink and nicely browned.
- 6. Assemble. In a large serving bowl, add all salad ingredients including lettuce, tomatoes, purple cabbage, avocado, corn, tortilla chips, and cooked shrimp.
- 7. Serve. Drizzle cilantro lime dressing on top and toss to combine.


