FROM PRESIDENT MORGAN!

Hey Neighbors,

It's front porch season, folks — there are few things I enjoy more than sitting out front with the family, feeling the breeze, cold beverage in hand, a Willie Nelson record spinning in the background, watching Dave meticulously snip the edges of the yard with the scissors, cars rumbling on the brick streets, Kyle working with his general contractor/mother on the next project (she is *not* happy with the sub), coaches and kids hustling up at Kirn Park, Bud tending to his garden, neighbors strolling along and stopping to say 'hi', and *the boys* (our cats) sunbathing in the driveway — watching the Tom turkeys flaunt for nearby hens. How do I love thee Gibraltar? Let me count the ways.

Not to bring my professional life into it, but this counting of experiences is something that pops up quite a bit when talking about events, parks, and places. What makes a place vibrant, resilient, and special? The Project for Public Spaces has a concept for this called The Power of 10+.

"The Power of 10+ shows how the act of paying attention can have immediate and widespread impact on the human experience when building a city's destinations and districts. The idea behind this concept is that places thrive when users have a range of reasons (10+) to be there.

These might include a place to sit, playgrounds to enjoy, art to touch, music to hear, food to eat, history to experience, and people to meet. Ideally, some of these activities will be unique to that particular place, reflecting the culture and history of the surrounding community. Local residents who use this space most regularly will be the best source of ideas for which uses will work best.

Further, when cities contain at least 10 of these destinations or districts, their public perception begins to shift amongst both locals and tourists, and urban centers can become better equipped for generating resilience and innovation." – Project for Public Spaces

For our neighborhood, both as a whole and on individual streets, the counting comes easy. For other neighborhoods and parts of our city – it can be difficult to get to double digits.

What I find really encouraging about this concept is that communities can be experimental, and start small – rather than trying to come up with some grand silver bullet idea! The little stuff adds up quickly, and doesn't require too much stress or capital.

Take our Fairmount Park "Trail head" (on 9th and High St.) as an example. Before our clean up in May, this place was pretty much dormant. While we still have a ways to go, we've taken small steps into really activating this space and "getting to 10+." There is now an established path to the trail system, signage is visible, the entrance has been manicured, and there is the natural beauty of the forest. *What else could we do?* Solar lighting, programming and scheduled hikes, proper/larger signage, parking spaces, a picnic table or seating area, doggy bag station, public art, etc.

Give it a try the next time you are walking around, or out on the town – get to counting! What ideas do you have and/or could help make a reality? A funky painted crosswalk, approaching the business owner or city about a bike rack or patio seating in front of your favorite downtown location, pink flamingos and potted plants, impromptu live music down on your porch or at the park, organize with some friends to fly kites on the corner, advocating for more complete streets and bike lanes, put a water bowl by your sidewalk for passing pooches! Let's keep making our neighborhood a vibrant and unique place to call home.

FIREWORKS ORDINANCES Please be respectful of your neighbors (and avoid a \$250 fine!)

I think we can all agree that celebrating our Nation's independence is a wonderful thing! And, for most folks, fireworks are a blast (literally and figuratively)! But, there are LAWS on fireworks use, and we need to observe them. Last year's 4th of July holiday definitely presented many challenges. Gibraltar neighbors were frustrated by ongoing late night and mid-week explosions, disrupting sleep patterns and causing distress for pets and for those affected by PTSD. City-wide, the police department reported a record number of complaints. These non-compliant fireworks also pose added fire risks and property damage risks.

Neighborhood Par Officer Daniel Stuck encourages us to <u>call 911 and REPORT these instances</u> (whether or not you expect that police will catch culprits in the act) - - the more complaints and reports they get, the more "hard evidence" they have for the need of additional enforcements or regulations regarding fireworks rules. Also, if possible, *safely* record video evidence of infractions and/or perpetrators. Law enforcement is *actively* seeking to cite & ticket any offenders when possible, and fines are hefty (a minimum of \$250!).



<u>ALLOWED DATES for fireworks use:</u> As of the writing of this article (late May) - the City Council <u>had not yet</u> decided the allowed days for fireworks use in 2019. The proposal currently being considered is for three days: <u>July 4, 5 & 6 (Thurs/Fri/Sat)</u>, from NOON to 11:00 p.m.

<u>This is not official</u> and is published here only to **reiterate the fact that discharging fireworks at any time other than immediately around the holiday IS <u>ILLEGAL</u>. You may feel like it's a harmless bit of fun, but for some people (and many animals), it is very traumatic. Should you choose to discharge fireworks during non-approved days/times, your neighbors have the right to report you. Thank you!**



GENERAL NOISE ORDINANCES

Barking Dogs at All Hours of the Day & Night-NOT OKAY

As a dog owner, I understand that there are certain times when your dog might need to be outside for a while (maybe you're mopping the floors... maybe Scruffy needs to burn off some energy... maybe you have dinner guests, etc.). Unfortunately, I've been hearing a lot of complaints lately from neighbors who are frustrated with the increased occurrence of dogs being left outside unattended for <u>long</u> periods of time—not just during the day, but also all night. **The problem is, DOGS BARK. A LOT.** *Not everyone is cool with that.*

According to City Ordinance Chapter 4.50.060-6.3d: *It is unlawful to own, possess or harbor any animal or bird which frequently or for continued duration, howls, barks, meows, squawks or makes other sounds which create a noise disturbance across a residential real property boundary.* That means if your neighbors can hear your dog barking for a continued duration, *you are breaking the law*. What I'm trying to say is that with warmer weather upon us, people will have their windows open. Having to listen to ANY noise that someone else is making (hammer clanking, dog barking, music thumping, etc.), repeatedly, day after day, night after night, IS NOT OKAY. If you **must** leave your barking dog outside all day, it might be time to invest in an anti-bark device. And barking dog(s) left outside *all night*? That is never okay.

Our neighbors deserve a place where they can relax and enjoy their surroundings. *Please be mindful that the noise you've learned to tune out can be extremely bothersome to others*. Thank you!

Greetings, Gibraltar Residents! My name is Ryan, and I am your mail carrier! I hope to get to know you better, so will first tell you a bit about myself! I am married and have 2 daughters. The oldest of my daughters is 24 and she lives in Oregon; the youngest is 8 and she lives with us here in Council Bluffs. I have been with the Postal Service for a little over $3^{1/2}$ years.

I was born and lived here in Council Bluffs until my sophomore year in high school when we moved to Eugene, Oregon. In high school I ran track and cross-country. After graduating from the University of Oregon with a B.S. degree, I went into the Peace Corps and spent two years in Paraguay, South America as an Agricultural Extensionist. 



Of Time and Tomatoes

I feel time now in a way that I didn't before. Like water when you cup your hands under a faucet and it falls between the gaps in your fingers no matter how hard you squeeze. I'm thirsty, too. All the time. It's deceptive, really, one only has so much capacity for water. One only has so much time. Some of us less so than others, but what do any of us really know about that? In my experience, not much.

I watched a girl dig a sandwich out of the garbage last week while I was waiting for the bus in front of the clinic. She had a large red Huskers sweater on even though it was eighty degrees and her hair was pulled back in a rough limp bun. I couldn't tell whether she was twenty or forty. The things we do to ourselves, I thought. The things we do to one another. After she fished it out - a nibbled-on Subway meat monstrosity - she sniffed it, inspected the ingredients, extracted the sliced tomato and threw it violently on the ground before eating the rest of the sandwich. I tried to imagine a life that leads to this moment, desperately hungry and passionately vengeful toward tomatoes. I failed.


The next morning the disgraced tomato was still there. The June sun had baked it into the sidewalk in a messy reddish crescent.

For all my work with addicts from every possible walk of life that have all ended up in this clinic, I have a notoriously bad imagination. I take most things quite literally. Subtext often escapes me, sarcasm bores me, and my general lack of a sense of humor (as determined by my younger colleagues) has inspired them to call me 'Lamy Poehler' behind my back. 'Parks & Rec' is actually one of the only shows I like. It's a good thing I'm in charge of the medication schedule as opposed to any of the therapy sessions. Talking about feelings isn't exactly my forte. And diabetes has made me even less sociable of late.

Tuesday saw a hailstorm of epic proportions. It was all anyone talked about for a week: general dismay, insurance headaches, and the destructive march of climate change. I brought two grilled cheese and tomato sandwiches to work and intentionally left one on top of the garbage can. Sure enough, the girl came back. This time her yellow hair fell down around her face like a shredded curtain. I watched as she wedged the tomato away from the congealed cheese with dirty fingernails and cast it aside with just as much disgust as before. The next morning there were two crusty red stains on the sidewalk, like phases of some gruesome moon.

I didn't tell anyone at work about my diagnosis. Pity never sat well with me. Not when my brother fell off that roof he was working on and ended up in a wheelchair. Not when my long-term girlfriend announced she was leaving me and moving to Grand Rapids to start a dog grooming business. Most definitely not when my doctor told me I'd joined the ranks of millions of women on a restrictive diet. I can still walk, run, administer methadone, play with my dogs, miss cultural references, plant peonies, unintentionally neglect said peonies, dominate a poker table, and make a mean grilled cheese and tomato sandwich. Only now, I feel the time inherent in each of these things. For the first time in my forty-one years I know, in my marrow, that these minutes, used or unused, are never coming back. It sounds so stupid because it's obvious. But to know something and to feel it - these are two different things.

This week I made two grilled cheese sandwiches, one with tomato and one without. After work I waited outside the clinic with both of them carefully wrapped in tinfoil. I didn't get on the first bus that came. Let the second one go, too. And the third. The sun dipped behind the low red-brick buildings. The girl never came. I noticed someone had cleaned the sidewalk next to the bus stop, so not even a shadow of the hated tomatoes remained. I got on the next bus, one sandwich short and fighting the strangest urge to cry.

Gibraltar: The Rock of Council Bluffs

A Vibrant, Historic Neighborhood on the Rise

Gordon Hitchcock is a self-proclaimed "old house geek," and has been since childhood. "I subscribed to *This Old House* magazine when I was 13," he admits.

So, in 2013, when he went looking for an affordable, old home where he could invest some "sweat equity" and house his licensed massage therapy practice, he looked no further than the Gibraltar neighborhood of Council Bluffs.

Located at the base of the Loess Hills, it is one of the area's oldest neighborhoods and includes the Willow/Bluff/Third Street Historic District. Its boundaries are the top of Fifth Avenue west to Fourth Street, and Ninth Avenue north to St. Peter's Church.

Gibraltar was named for a rugged, 250-foot-high dirt mound resembling the Iberian landmark (the Rock of Gibraltar), which once sat at the corner of Fifth Avenue and Third Street. The massive hill was razed in the mid-1950s to allow for more home construction.

The neighborhood's 200-plus homes represent a variety of architectural styles. Many were built by railroad titans, military generals, doctors, lawyers, and prominent businessmen in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Gibraltar is also home to the historic Bregant House (at 517 Fourth St.), built for two married entrepreneurial vaudeville stars with dwarfism.

Hitchcock has spent six years converting his massive 1868 Italianate villa—which was originally built by a retired judge and included a small law office space—from apartments back into a single-family home. Thankfully, most of the house was brought up to code in the early '90s, with new HVAC, plumbing, and electric wiring, he says.

While he's made great progress on the first and second floors, the basement and large attic space remain unfinished. If converted, the house's usable area will be 6,400 square feet. It's "my little art project," he jokes.

Where Community and Architecture Meet

Gibraltar's ornate, one-of-a-kind, turn-of-the-century residences initially draw many prospective homebuyers. But it's more than the homes that make the neighborhood special.

Retired couple Amy and Dave Adams have lived in Gibraltar for 20 years—first on Third Street, then relocating to Clark Avenue in 2003. Their Craftsman-style home, built about 1912, is on a dead-end street and backs to a private wooded area.

"But the best part of our home is the view," Amy says. "We have trees all around us...beautiful red maples. And old, lovely homes that are well-maintained." They have two porches from which to enjoy the scenery.

While they appreciate the hand-crafted woodwork, pocket doors, and



charms of their "warm and cozy" home, it's their neighbors that they would miss most if they left, Amy says.

They credit the Gibraltar Neighborhood Association (GNA) for promoting a real sense of community among a diverse homeowner base. Amy served on its board for a time, as did her husband as treasurer.

"The association does a wonderful job dealing with streets and curbing and other issues, working with the city to resolve them," she says. "They've also done a lot to grow homeowner participation. There are always new members joining, serving, coming to events. We've met some great people."

The Adamses enjoy attending the annual GNA Christmas party, hosted by a different homeowner each year, and try to attend the regular social meetings held by GNA. "It's hard to get to meet everybody, so we've decided to appoint block captains to help with flow of communication."

Developing Neighborhood Initiatives

Amy says that when they moved in 16 years ago, "We were the young people on the block. Now we're the older folk. The neighborhood is transitioning. A young woman down the street just bought her mother's house. You're seeing that more...homes becoming multi-generational."

A prime example is Cory Peters. The graphic designer has been a Gibraltar resident for most of her life. "I was born and raised four houses down from where I live now," she says. Today, she resides in the midcentury ranch home she bought from her parents in 2000 (which was built where the namesake dirt mound once sat). A former GNA president and its current newsletter editor, Peters was instrumental in helping Gibraltar win second place in the Neighborhoods, USA national competition in the "Social Revitalization" category in 2016.

Peters says since its founding just 10 years ago, GNA has been proactive, partnering with groups like Habitat for Humanity, The 712 Initiative, City of Council Bluffs, historical groups, and others on ways to improve Gibraltar and the community as a whole.

To date, GNA has spearheaded the effort to create and install historic district banners on streetlights throughout Gibraltar. It's also contributed funds to buy new holiday decorations for nearby Bayliss Park, as well as helped raise money for Historic General Dodge House.

Currently, GNA sponsors an annual spring clean-up day, and the association's sidewalk repair initiative is ongoing. Gibraltar participates in a historical home bus tour, along with Fairmont Park and Bayliss Park neighborhoods. Recently, the association also initiated an art project at Fourth and Worth streets.

"We pitched the idea of a historic mural being installed on the south wall of the Pottawattamie County Genealogical Society building adjacent to some green space," Peters says. "The contents of the mural will be decided by neighbors and include imagery from Council Bluffs from the last 150 years. The goal is to have the mural in place in late spring."

Peters says GNA has worked with The 712 Initiative in recent months to purchase a block party trailer, which houses tables and chairs, barricades, carnival games, coolers, and other items essential for hosting community events. Gibraltar block parties are planned for this summer and fall.

"All of Council Bluffs will have access to the trailer," she explains. "We're going to share it. They can use it to build neighborhood relationships, as well as help bring all people together and build a stronger community."

Peters is proud of what GNA has accomplished in its short existence, but says it has no shortage of goals moving forward. Its longterm planning guide on its website spells out the details.

"Being fairly young, we're lagging behind many Omaha developments," she adds. "We're still learning and have a ways to go."

Affordable History Near Downtown Omaha

Two of Gibraltar's newest residents are David and Anna Brooks. The couple purchased a three-story Colonial Revival built around 1906 (the exact year is disputed), in December 2017.

David, 31, was drawn to Gibraltar because of its proximity to his downtown Omaha office, where he practices law, and Fairmont Park with its running trails. Anna, 28, who works in finance from home, also loves having Bayliss Park, the Old Market, the library, and Council Bluffs' city center a close jaunt from home. The couple are expecting their first child, a girl, this spring.

The Brooks considered several Omaha metro neighborhoods when relocating from Iowa City, settling on Gibraltar because of the value it offered.

"The quality you get for the price over here is tremendous," Anna says. "Our home has incredible character. We never thought we'd be able to afford a house in this neighborhood."

Their home features 9-foot-high ceilings and 8-foot-tall windows, allowing great natural light. A three-season porch and an oversized corner lot are other features that captured the hearts of the Brooks. "And we have a great view of downtown Omaha from our second- and third-floor windows." Anna adds.

David, who serves as GNA secretary, feels a civic duty to helping Gibraltar prosper. "Older neighborhoods have suffered and are still recovering from urban sprawl," David says. "Having a strong downtown core is important, and this neighborhood is central to that effort in Council Bluffs."

David says they look forward to spending many years in their home. "The character of the people in this neighborhood is amazing," he adds. "Life throws twists and turns at you, and our neighbors are extremely supportive. We don't have much family here, and so they've turned into our new family."


