
The December **Luminaria Event** has unfortunately been postponed. We are working to reschedule this for 2017! Happy holidays!



YARD WASTE TIPS!!

As we move into the end of summer and the leaves begin to fall, you may have more yard waste to set at your curb. Here are some tips and reminders for your yard waste.

Remember to <u>always</u> separate trash from yard waste. These items are collected separately by RR Waste Solutions, the City's waste hauler. If yard waste is not separate, it will be tagged and not collected.

On your curb, place your yard waste a **few feet away from trash**, so waste haulers recognize where one ends and the other begins.

Yard waste may be placed in a regular garbage can, City-approved Poly-cart or paper yard waste bags. **Mark containers with a "Y"** or place an orange yard waste sticker on each can.

Gather limbs and branches into bundles no more than 4' in length, 2' in diameter & 60 pounds in weight.

Tie yard waste bundles with string or twine.

Yard waste is unlimited through November 30.

Pumpkins, corn stalks and other garden waste can be placed with yard waste.

THE HISTORY AROUND US-

Council Bluffs Crèche and Its Work

October 18, 1903 Article from The Daily Bee Newspaper

Standing in a beautiful glen nestling at the foot of one of the tall bluffs of Fairmount Park can be seen a commodious two-story frame house, once the home of a well-known family. Externally, there is nothing to distinguish it from any ordinary family dwelling, save for a large sign across the front of it, which reads "Associated Charities Crèche." Here it is that one of the most deserving, but probably least known of the charitable institutions of Council Bluffs has its home.

This handsome building on Ninth Avenue, just east of Third Street, in which the crèche is located, is the result of three year's hard work and perseverance on the part of the members of the Associated Charities. Three years ago

the need of a day nursery or crèche in Council Bluffs was forcibly impressed upon the minds of several of the women who were more or less actively engaged in the charitable work of one kind or another. The result was the organization of the Associated Charities in December, 1900, with Mrs. Anna B. Phelps as its first president. Starting with practically nothing, the association rented a house on Avenue E and Tenth Street and started a day nursery. Mrs. Caroline Johnson was installed as superintendent, which position she has retained ever since. Here also, under the direction of Miss Aylesworth, now Mrs. Beals of New York, and Miss Ellen Dodge, now Mrs. Edgar Scott, was started a "kitchen" garden and sewing circle by means of which young girls were instructed in the art of household duties.

The association had much to overcome at the outset of its career. To equip and furnish the home on Avenue D and Tenth Street was a serious problem. Donations came in but slowly and Mrs. Johnson, the superintendent, recalls the time when the children had to be fed in relays, as there were not sufficient chairs to seat them all at the same time at the table. The crèche had its home on Avenue D and Tenth Street for one year, when the needs of larger premises necessitated the Association to seek a bigger house. The Beck home on Glen Avenue was secured, and here the crèche remained for another year. Last May the Association, having overcome all difficulties and obstacles for two years, decided to secure a home of its own. The incoming of the Great Western necessitated the removal of many houses along its right of way. One of the houses that had to be moved was the old Hanthorn family home. Through the assistance of County Treasurer Arnd, the Associated Charities became the purchaser of the house and it was removed to its present beautiful location on Ninth Avenue.

The house contains fourteen rooms, with laundry and furnace room in the basement. On the ground floor is the office, superintendent's apartments, receiving room, boys' dormitory, children's dining room, and kitchen. On the second floor is the "crèche" proper. Here are two large bright rooms, in which twenty or more little white iron cots can be seen, each with its little occupant. Here the babies have their home. On this floor are also the nurses' sleeping room, a dormitory for the elder children, and the diet kitchen. The work of caring for twenty or more babies can be better understood when it is stated that every day 200 bottles, from which the little ones are fed, have to be washed. In the diet kitchen is where all the milk used is sterilized. ...continued on next page

In the crèche at present are thirty children, ranging in age from the 2-weeks-old babe to girls and boys of 12 years. Of these children, six are orphans who are being cared for until suitable homes can be found for them. The mothers of the little babies being mostly of the working class, many of them being employed as domestics. The children are cared for at the crèche, that is, fed and clothed and given medical attendance if sick, for the small sum of \$2 a week. While this is the stipulated charge, many times the mother is unable to even pay this, but her child receives the same care.

The work of the Associated Charities is not limited to the caring for children at the crèche. It reaches far out. A helping hand is extended at all times to young girls and women who are leading a wayward life and they are given a refuge and every assistance to reform. At present there are four young women in the home who have been rescued through the efforts of Mrs. Johnson, the superintendent. They will be cared for until suitable employment can be found for them.

The association supplies many a poor family during the year with provisions, fuel, clothing and other necessaries of life, furnishes medicine to the sick and provides transportation to their homes to many a destitute person. In connection with its work among the sick poor, the association feels the need greatly of a trained visiting nurse. The lack of funds alone prevents the association from keeping such a nurse, but is in hope that before long it will be able to do so. Mrs. Johnson is frequently called upon at all hours of the day and night by some sick poor person, but is unable to leave the home.

Outside of the small sum received for the care of the babies in the crèche, the Associated Charities depends upon voluntary contributions to carry on its work. Visitors are always welcome at the crèche and Mrs. Johnson, the superintendent, is always ready to show them through the building. The present officers of the Associated Charities are; President, Mrs. Jacob Sims; vice president, Mrs. George T. Phelps; secretary, Miss Beebe; treasurer, Mrs. P. J. Montgomery; corresponding secretary, Miss Elizabeth Squire; counsellor, Miss Dodge; and auditors, Mrs. Ray Bixby and Mrs. George Keeline.

GNA General Meeting Minutes from September 21, 2016

Held at Our Saviors Lutheran (OSL) with 16 attendees

Meeting called to order at 6:05 p.m. by President Cory Peters.

As the Walters sisters have been ill, Jeff Ketcham filled in as Secretary, and Cory relayed information from Event Chairwoman Ann Walters regarding upcoming events as follows:

Recap of October Meeting: All About BEES!!

MANY thanks to Gibraltar residents and beekeepers Darwin Baker and Turner Morgan for their *fascinating* presentation on bees and beekeeping at the October general meeting!!!

Did you know:


There are three types of bees in a hive: Queen, Worker & Drone. The drone (male bee) enjoys a life of leisure, as his only responsibility is to mate with the queen!! Conversely, the worker bees (all female) pollinate, find food, gather nectar, build the comb, and more. (Insert your own joke of your choice about men v. women here... lol).

Honey Bees will travel up to five miles from their hive to gather food. To make one pound of honey, the bees in a colony must visit 2 million flowers and fly over 55,000 miles! A single honey bee will only produce about 1/12 teaspoon of honey in her lifetime. AND, out of approx. 20,000 species of bees, only four make honey!

Darwin and Turner also brought samples of their *own* "homemade" honey, and it was so COOL to do a side-by-side taste test! Darwin, who lives at the north end of 3rd Street, and Turner, who lives on the south end of Clark Street, discussed how climate, foliage, and other factors can impact the flavor of honey. It was amazing how different their two samples tasted! Thanks also to Christie Baker for bringing fresh bread samples for everyone to dip their honey in—what a yummy, sweet treat!! **P.S.—Did you know... honey never goes bad!!**
















What the heck is a Quarter Auction?

What's a "Quarter Auction" you ask? It sort of combines the best of both worlds... *the fun and excitement of an auction, with the random chance of a lottery drawing!* It allows you the opportunity to win great prizes without having to spend a lot of money!



Here's how it works:

- 1) Take a look at all of the COOL items up for auction! There is no entry fee to observe, however you DO need to purchase a "bidding paddle" (with its corresponding unique bidding number) to sit at a table.
- 2) Make "change" with our banker for a gob of quarters (or, bring your own quarter supply!)

- 5) Our Emcee for the evening will begin "bidding" process for each item with a description of the item, and will announce *the number of quarters required to participate* in the drawing for each item. The number of quarters needed is based on an approximate value of the auction item, as follows:

Bid of 1 quarter = \$10 item value Bid of 2 quarters = \$20 item value Bid of 3 quarters = \$30 item value

6) <u>If you want to take a chance on the item</u>, to make a bid you raise your paddle(s) and put the corresponding number of quarters in the bowl on your table. Remember, you can bid with multiple paddles to increase your odds, so if you are bidding with *three* paddles and the auction item requires a *two quarter bid*, you need to put <u>SIX quarters in the bowl</u> (two quarters for each of your three paddles)!

NOTE: You can return to banker to purchase additional paddles or to exchange bills for quarters BEFORE bidding begins or ends.

- 9) When bidding ends, runners will collect Quarter Bowls and replace with empty bowls. Keep your paddle(s) held up for the Auctioneer to see!
- 10) The Auctioneer will pull paddle number markers from the Auction Jar until a match is made (not all paddles will be entered for every item, so if your non-entered paddle number is called, you would shout, "No Bid!" If the marker number matches your <u>raised</u> paddle, you win the bid and the item!


Anyone coming into the American Legion that evening is welcome to participate in the Quarter Auction as long as they purchase a paddle to sit at a table. Others may stand and observe.

Gibraltar: Xenophon Kynett Home, 625 Bluff St.

This very early brick house, built in 1862, was the home of Xenophon W. Kynett, a druggist. He was born in 1827 at Weathersfield, Trumbull County, Ohio, one of eight children of Jacob and Annie Kynett. According to his obituary, "His grandfather was a native of Alsace, on the border of France and Austria, and after coming to this country and living fifteen years in Adams County, Pennsylvania, removed to Trumbull County, Ohio.

"Mr. Kynett attended district school, reading law and medicine in the mornings and evenings, and in 1848 was admitted to the bar in Portage County, Ohio, going there to expedite admittance, and practiced law in Canalsdover, Ohio."

He came to Council Bluffs in 1854. His first assignment here was to be appointed receiver of the book store of Mawhinny & Putnam. He later purchased the store which was located on Broadway. The store prospered and, after eight years, he sold his interest to his partner, H.H. Oberholtzer.

His obituary states that Kynett "turned to the manufacture of patent medicines, of which he was the pioneer in this part of the country, making a specialty of one which a medical friend had successfully used in India, who, in turn, had gotten it from the Brahmins. Kynett claimed they had used it among them for 2,500,000 years."

Xenophon Kynett wore many hats. His obituary continues: "In 1856, he formed a law and real estate partnership with D.C. Bloomer, which continued for several years. In the same year when this city was a rendezvous for French fur traders bound for the northwest, there being here quite a French colony, he was appointed a French consul by Louis Napoleon of France, and served for three years when the needs of such an office were ended."

Also in 1856, he was elected justice of the peace and served four years. He was admitted to the bar in 1857 in this county but did not practice law. He moved to St. Louis in 1878 where he spent five years in the drug business. While there he was offered the chair of chemistry in a college of medicine, but decided to go on the road with his medicines, traveling over Kansas, Missouri and Iowa, and returned to Council Bluffs in 1888.

Kynett Medicine Co. advertisements, found in newspapers and city directories, claim he was a dealer in drugs, medicines, school books, stationery, toys, fancy goods, glassware, and shop furniture... and "will compose in a careful and scientific manner, physicians' prescriptions and family recipes."

In 1877, Xenophon Kynett married Cordelia Susan Bayes who was born in Missouri in 1854. The couple had four sons – Xenophon W., Leslie, Donald, and Leo. Mr. Kynett died in 1904, Cordelia in 1931. The Kynetts are buried in Fairview Cemetery.

The brick house, now painted, features three steep gabled wall dormers across the front with Gothic windows in each and a Gothic hood over the centered front door. Two corbelled brick chimneys are original. The house originally had a full-width front porch which can be seen in the 1868 panorama illustration of Council Bluffs. The nomination of the Willow/Bluff/Third Street district to the National Register of Historic Places calls it a "rare triple-gabled dormer example of a Gothic Revival cottage; very important architecturally in the district".

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
