FROM PRESIDENT MORGAN!

Happy Autumn, Neighbors!

I am happy to announce that the Gibraltar Neighborhood Association was awarded a \$20,000 Match Grant from the Wellmark Foundation towards the installation of a proper trailhead into Fairmount Park at the corner of 9th Ave and High Street! This is the only foot entrance on the west end of the park and is currently overgrown and subject to dumping. We have a multitude of neighborhood walkers (human and dog!), hikers, and out-of-town visitors who would take advantage of this trailhead. Fairmount Park is a HUGE asset to our corner of the world, and we'd like to see more positive foot traffic utilizing the its trail system and appreciating its beauty!

IMPORTANT INFO: With this match grant, our neighborhood is challenged to secure \$10,000 by Nov. 5th to receive the \$20,000 grant, adding up to **a total of \$30,000 for the project**. Half of the \$10k is required to be cash, which we will be pulling from our Gibraltar Neighborhood Association treasury, and the other \$5k can be in-kind donations (that means either monetary donations and/or donated labor or materials). We will have until December 2020 to complete the project – giving us plenty of time to collaborate and organize with the Parks Department on materials, features, and design.

WE NEED YOU!!

Please let us know **by Oct 31st** if you have **PERSONAL TIME or TREASURE** to donate towards the match of our trailhead grant. Every dollar counts! And every hour of your time is worth \$24.69 – so if you pledged to volunteer four hours... that would be almost **\$100 towards meeting our \$5,000 goal!**

Don't worry if physical labor isn't in your wheelhouse – we could use volunteers to help make lunches for our workers, to call and recruit businesses to donate towards the cause (I know you all have handy friends or family members!), to take photos and document the process... all sorts of activities! This is a really wonderful opportunity for our community to work together and help beautify and restore one of our natural treasures. 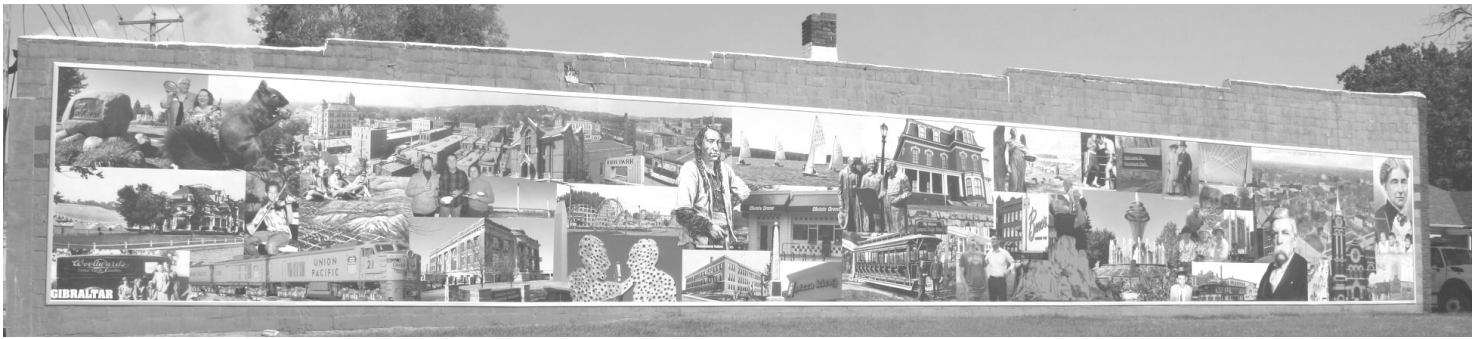
YOU NEED TO GET INVOLVED!

Neighborhood Historic Mural Installed!

It's been a loooooong process, but we are so happy to finally be able to report that the large mural project we started working on late last year has finally been completed!

As you may recall, the 712 Initiative organization made money available to area neighborhoods last fall as part of a "Walkability Project" effort to help beautify our neighborhoods. One of the ideas we proposed was a large banner on the south-facing wall of the Genealogical Society building at the corner of Worth and 4th. When we were awarded the grant to do this project, the legwork began, but it was a slow (and somewhat painful!) process to get all of the pieces in place.

A shout out to Gibraltar resident & artist Cory Peters, who sorted through and compiled all of the photo submissions and then pieced together the collage artwork for the banner. An even BIGGER shout out to GNA President Turner Morgan, who found a company to manufacture the mural, and then the HARDER part—found the resource to INSTALL the mural.

Take a minute and go check it out—it's 100 feet long and 12 feet high (wow!!!), and located on Worth Street between Main and 4th! The mural is jam-packed with images from the very beginnings of Council Bluffs, as well as modern images from the past few years. ***And look for neighborhood faces you may recognize:***

> **Cathy Walters Hill and Cory Peters:** both these gals grew up in Gibraltar, moved away, moved back, and purchased their Gibraltar homes from their parents! (They are just two of the many multi-generation families who have loved Gibraltar!) Both served 4-year terms on the GNA board: Cory as President & Cathy as Secretary.

> **Paulette Brandt, Steve Gorman and Chris Gorman:** Steve and Paulette served Gibraltar as the 1st and 2nd Neighborhood Association presidents, and Steve currently is a Board member. Chris served on the GNA board & has *delivered* the Rock Talk newsletter to your doorstep for the past 11 years... THANK YOU Chris!

> **Dave Adams and Kyle McGinn:** Dave and Kyle are neighbors at the top of Clark Avenue and are very involved in the neighborhood. Dave is a former GNA treasurer, and Kyle currently serves on the GNA board. The photo shows them sharing a hearty laugh at a neighborhood picnic last summer.

> **Kent Madison:** shown gleefully holding his granddaughter Gavin (who also a Gibraltar resident!). Kent is the talented artist behind the Gibraltar mound illustration you'll see below him on the mural, which is also on the Rock Talk Masthead and on our yard flags. Sadly, Kent lost his cancer battle a few years ago, but his wonderful wife Mary still lives in the neighborhood.

> **Connie Bartel, Irene Peters, Bumpy Bennett, Mayor Matt Walsh:** These three grand dames each lived in Gibraltar for 40-50 years, the Bennetts having been a Gibraltar family for even longer (Bumpy and her husband Lyman purchased the home from Lyman's mother, and Bumpy's daughter Kathy now owns the home.) Mayor Walsh—a former Gibraltar resident!—was on hand to keep these gals from causing trouble—*heehee!*

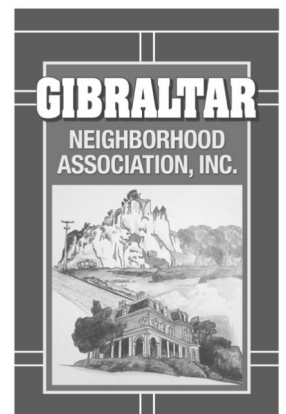


GNA Yard Flags!

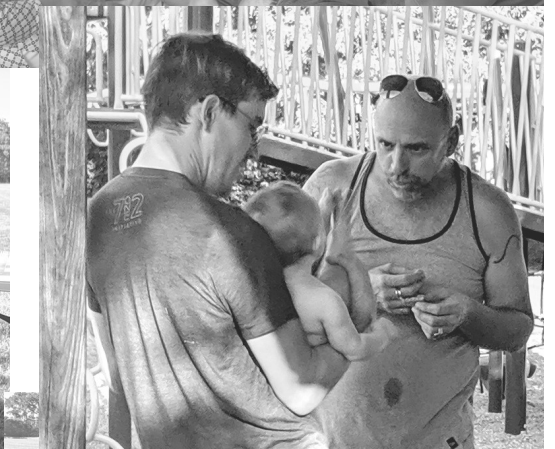

I only found out about your cancer through Facebook. How screwed up is that? I don't recognize you in the photos. Although, to be fair, you probably wouldn't recognize me either (because I'm fat). For all the weight it looks like you've lost, I've gained all of it and then some.

Are you still a fan of gallows humor? I'd understand if not.

Anyway, all this to say I'm sorry for what you're going through. I'm sorry for all the pain. For the lost energy and the lost time. I wish I could take it all away. You want to know why I know I peaked at seven-years-old? That's the year you considered me a friend.

I don't know if this letter will reach you in time. I hope it does. I don't know what "hospice" means exactly, only that it's not good.

One thing you can say for yourself, Adam, that not many people can –

You never peaked.

City Codes Are Designed to Help Make Our Neighborhood a Better Place to Live FOR ALL

Every now and then, unaware neighbors do or don't do things that overflow onto or impact our neighborhood. Each one of us has inadvertently (and yes, sometimes unintentionally or carelessly) disturbed the enjoyment, peace, or solitude of our neighbors.

Overgrown grass, overrun weeds, shrubs and/or trees with dead branches needing pruned... these things are not only unsightly, but are often in violation of City Codes, and potentially could cause injury. Maybe it is garbage cans that overflow and/or are left curbside for too many days — leading to waste and debris that are taken by the winds and deposited elsewhere to clutter and decay. Maybe it is parked cars left unattended, unmoved, or inoperable, slowly being consumed by overgrown grass and weeds. Maybe it is mown grass or raked leaves that are carelessly blown into the street.

Being respectful of your neighbors (and your neighborhood) immeasurably improves the quality of everyone's lives. Being aware of codes that affect a homeowner's public and private lands is an easy way to help our historic neighborhood continue to improve, and enhances the quality of life for all residents. There is a covenant that promises each of us a peaceful home. That "quiet enjoyment" is your right to undisturbed, non-hostile use and satisfaction. Following City Codes helps our neighborhood, protects your privacy, increases our property values, and mitigates many of the most common neighborhood problems.

Here's what you can do (common issues)

If the nuisance is weeds, grass, garbage, general concerns, pot holes, yard debris, dogs barking or nuisance animals, missed garbage collection, parked or abandoned vehicles: you can HELP by confidentially writing the City and the Mayor's office using the following link:

Let the City staff work on your behalf. They want the same things you do: a better city made up of better neighborhoods, and they NEED YOU to help them by alerting them to neighborhood issues about which you're concerned. They'll decide what to do.

Thank you for helping our neighborhood become a better place, where everyone is no more or no less important than another.

SPEAKING OF CITY CODES.... Open Burn Ordinance

With the cooler weather, folks are compelled to be outside, enjoying the cooler weather... and what's better than a bonfire on a Fall evening! However, the City Code limits the type of fires you can have, so here's a condensed run-down of what is and isn't allowed. For more detailed information on City Codes, go to: library.municode.com/ia/council_bluffs/codes/code_of_ordinances

- 1) Open burning is prohibited. This means the burning of any material that results in contaminants from combustion being emitted directly into the ambient air without passing through a stack or chimney from any enclosed chamber.
- 2) This does not apply to outdoor fireplaces or BBQ grills used solely for the noncommercial preparation of food. These fireplaces or grills can't be used for burning refuse or combustible waste.
- 3) Fire containment devices like fire pits and chimineas may be used but are subject to certain provisions:
 - no outdoor burning allowed if winds exceed 10 mph
 - fires must be constantly attended by a responsible adult until thoroughly extinguished
 - fire containment devices shall not be permitted within 15 feet of any combustible structure, or within 10 feet of a lot line (unless mutually agreed upon by neighboring property owner)
 - fire pits or other fire containment devices shall not exceed 3 feet in diameter
 - flames shall be kept below 2 feet in height above the pit or containment device
 - a portable fire extinguisher or garden hose must be readily available
 - excessive smoke or odor emissions are prohibited

Why You Shouldn't Blow Leaves and Grass Clippings Into the Street



It is part of the City's mandate to educate residents about the impacts of certain practices on the stormwater system and the quality of the protected 'waters of the

state'. This information about proper yard waste disposal practices is to inform citizens about what is a violation of the City's Municipal Code.

Grass clippings and leaves blown or swept into storm drains or into the street harms waterways and our creeks. Storm drains flow into pipes and into drainageways. When anything but rain and snow melt goes down the storm drain, it can become a drainage problem. Improper disposal of yard wastes, including leaves, have the potential to impact water quality and cause drainage problems during a storm event.

Did you know?

- When yard waste is discarded or blown into the street, it can cause flooding problems. Leaves and yard debris can block the natural flow of water in the storm drainage system, which can cause water to back up and flood within the drainage system.
- When yard waste is discarded in the street, it will decompose. Decomposing yard waste can supercharge the water supply with nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorus, causing algae blooms resulting in low dissolved oxygen. Severely low dissolved oxygen levels in creeks can cause fish kills. According to the U.S. EPA, phosphorus is one of the most troublesome pollutants in stormwater runoff and it is considered the primary cause of water quality problems in our country.
- When yard waste is discarded within the stormwater drainage system, it can bring harmful chemicals into creeks, including fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides. While these chemicals can be used to protect grass, they will harm aquatic life and cause additional adverse affects to water quality when released into streams.

Proper Management and Disposal

- Grass clippings can be left on the ground improve the health of the lawn itself. There is no excuse for sweeping grass and/or leaves into the storm drains or waterways.
- The City street sweepers can barely keep up with the leaves already on the ground; please don't add to the burden by sweeping or blowing leaves into the streets. Consider starting a compost pile for leaves and yard waste or invest in a mulching blade for your lawn mower.
- Leaves can be bagged and left for yard waste pickup.
- We appreciate your cooperation in maintaining the quality of our state's water by practicing yard waste disposal methods discussed above. Failure to comply with this may result in a citation or additional enforcement action.

Emergency Repair Program

CITY OF COUNCIL BLUFFS

EMERGENCY REPAIR PROGRAM

The Emergency Repair Program provides assistance and support to homeowners in need of repairs to correct hazardous housing conditions.

If you experience a sudden issue that poses a threat to the health, safety, and well-being of the occupant(s) of the home, contact us. Funding is available for eligible homeowners.

We will help you through the entire process from start to finish alongside qualified, licensed, and professional contractors.

FUNDING

The Emergency Repair Program provides grants to eligible homeowners in need of repairs. The grants do not need to be repaid.

Homeowners can receive up to \$5,000 in Emergency Repair grants.

To be eligible for the Emergency Repair Program homeowners must meet the income limits, see chart for details.

HOW TO PARTICIPATE

APPLICATION

Call Lora Flom at (712) 256-6947 to determine your eligibility. If you meet the guidelines you will receive an application and instructions for completion.

INSPECTION

Upon completion of the application, we will schedule an inspection to determine the nature of the problem and what repairs the Emergency Repair Program can help with.

CONTRACTORS

Upon approval of your application, you will receive a list of qualified contractors. You must select at least two contractors to bid on your project. The contractor submitting the lowest responsible bid will be awarded the contract.

ELIGIBILITY

To be eligible for the Emergency Repair Program you must:

- Be the owner-occupant of a single-family residential dwelling for a period of 6 months
- Be located within Council Bluffs city limits
- Be current on all real estate taxes and sanitation fees
- Meet the income limits (see chart)

Note: Properties purchased with a land contract are not eligible.
