Improvements to Kirn Field Made Possible by Mutual of Omaha Grant

Thanks to the combined efforts of the Gibraltar and Fairmont Park Neighborhood Associations, the city is participating in efforts to clean up and beautify the Kirn Field City Park.

Carol Mattox, of FPNA, first wrote the grant in the Spring. She. along with some members of Gibraltar, then met with Larry Foster, the head of Parks and Recreation for the City of Council Bluffs. It was decided that the city will help with efforts to clean up weeds in the fences, use power washers to help take paint off buildings, and seal off the back of the stadium structure. The grant from Mutual of Omaha will go towards the purchase of the paint for all buildings on Kirn Field. Mutual of Omaha will be in charge of organizing the 2- to 3-day efforts of fifty volunteers scheduled to work in September on the project. Better still, Larry Foster and Mayor Hanafan are also in the process of creating a long term plan for improvement to the park, such as barriers for the track entrance, more cinder for the track and better access for the disabled.
